

DISTRICT DIRECTIONS

Every Toastmasters Member Deserves to Belong to a Distinguished Club

Why should clubs care about Distinguished status? Because it's all about club quality. Clubs that are doing everything they should to achieve quality – adding members regularly, training officers, earning education awards – will likely end up Distinguished or better even if that's not the club goal.

And why do our members deserve this level of quality, whether their clubs are striving for Distinguished status or not? Because our members are paying for a specific program, outlined in our manuals and supported by 92 years of tradition, success, and growth. Is it fair to deprive members of education awards because your club doesn't encourage manual speeches? Is it fair for members to constantly take multiple meeting roles because your club isn't interested in growth? Is it smart to discourage guests from becoming members by having meetings so tiny and disorganized that the club doesn't seem like a pleasant place to be?

At this writing, 17 of our clubs are extremely well positioned for Distinguished or better status, with another 10 also having a good chance to achieve Distinguished. Wouldn't it be wonderful to meet or **exceed the 29 Distinguished clubs** we had in 2015-2016? For the clubs that are working hard toward Distinguished, please accept my thanks and the appreciation of all of the District leadership on your club's excellence performance to date.

Those clubs that aren't quite there will probably find charter-strength membership of 20 the toughest nut to crack, and may benefit from the list of tips below:

Tips to Build Membership

- Renewals: Since you may lose members during the current renewal period look at ways to ensure you attain charter strength after April 1.
- Be sure your treasurer submits dues on time to Toastmasters International, especially since contestants can be affected by late submissions.
- Plan at least 1 guest-attracting event between now and early May: Open House, Speechcraft, Communication Workshop, Leadership Workshop, etc.
- Plan a membership-building strategy for Beat the Clock, May 1 to June 30.
- Ask for resources: The District has plentiful marketing materials and a limited ad budget. Just ask.

The other sticking point for clubs seeking Distinguished status is education awards; here are some tips for those:

Tips for Education Awards

- Encourage your members to continue earning education awards
- Encourage your VPE to keep submitting them and to consider prioritizing scheduling speakers close to completing an award.
- Give award winners plenty of recognition.


















District Lessons of Leadership

Leadership is hard. A few months ago, while I was on vacation, I participated in what has come to be known as "The Worst Conference Call in History." Worse, I played a major role in how terrible it was. I was frustrated and took it out on meeting participants.

I make this public because it's a valuable lesson. The positive thing about a leadership journey is that we learn and grow from our mistakes. In fact, if we didn't make mistakes, we probably wouldn't grow. Still, I deeply regret this one.

Here's what I learned from this dreadful meeting:

 Always have an agenda and distribute it as far in advance as possible. Our Toastmasters club meetings depend on agendas to keep from running off the rails. The same is true of any meeting we conduct as an organization. Agendas enable meetings to be kept to their allotted times. They ensure order. Ideally, they allow for all participants to have a voice. Announce at the beginning of the meeting that participants are expected to stick to the agenda.



got purpose?

- Be sure participants understand the purpose of the meeting. The meeting in question was about strategizing, but several participants treated it as an information-sharing session.
- If the meeting depends on all participants being up to speed on the topics discussed, distribute information BEFORE the meeting for participants to review, digest, and react to. The horrific meeting in question derailed, in part, because various people felt they needed to share information before we could even get into the agenda. If that information had been shared, say, by email, before the meeting, we could have done a better job of sticking to the agenda.
- Limit participants to those who understand the issue being discussed so you don't waste valuable time bringing people up to speed. Be sure everyone knows who has been invited to the meeting and what their knowledge needs are.
- If you're angry and frustrated, consider muting yourself, keeping quiet, or even skipping the meeting. This one is mostly addressed to myself, but it could happen to anyone. Above all, don't let your frustration turn you into a snippy shrew toward your colleagues.
- If you mess up, take ownership. I apologized to the people I
 hurt in this meeting and for how poorly the meeting was planned and executed. I don't know if
 they will ever trust and respect me again the way they did before, but I know that as the top
 dog in the district, the buck stops here. I will never hesitate to take responsibility for my
 mistakes, and if I've made any without realizing it, please call me out on them.

Jennifer Henage's Family to Accept Posthumous DTM for the Late, Beloved Toastmaster

Through the tireless efforts of Jennifer Henage's best friend, Amy Mayer, Jennifer has been awarded a Distinguished Toastmaster designation posthumously. Jennifer's mother, Linda Duffield, and other family members will attend the DTM ceremony at the Spring Conference in Wenatchee to accept her medal.

Jennifer died unexpectedly of natural causes on Dec. 29, 2016, at Kootenai Health in Coeur d'Alene. Born Feb. 1, 1967, in Provo, UT, Jennifer graduated from the University of Idaho with a Bachelor of Arts degree in German and political science. She worked for 24 years at North Idaho College, where, according to the *Coeur d'Alene Press* (from which this article is adapted), the North Idaho College (NIC) staff described her as "a tireless promoter of student success."

Jennifer was an active member of *Coeur d'Alene Toastmasters* and *Liberty Lakers*, where she held many leadership roles at several levels, some with repeated tenure to help keep clubs active. She loved the process of speaking, and helping others to achieve a quality learning experience. She was a consistent winner of Toastmaster competitions, excelling in Humorous Speech category, implicating many family and friends in her form of levity.

District Council to Vote on District Alignment at Spring Conference

The first time I met **Adena Sabins** was at a speech contest. She's one of those people who has the kind of life that has lots of fodder for speeches. She talked about her difficult childhood and how she overcame it with



grace, humor, and wit. She won that contest, and for good reason. I always marvel at what I learn about my fellow Toastmasters as they give their speeches at my home club and even in speech contests. I also admire Toastmasters who can be honest and real about their lives, demonstrating vulnerability and inspiration at the same time. Adena is one of those Toastmasters, and she's one of the most inspirational speakers in our district.

I'm proud to introduce Adena to the rest of District 9, those who perhaps haven't had the pleasure of hearing her give speeches at her home club, *Colville Toastmasters*, or at speech contests. I and the rest of the Trio have selected her as District 9's "Webpage Guru." Her duties include helping clubs improve their websites, since having high-quality and accurate websites is the best way to promote clubs and attract new members. She has already contacted and worked with several clubs in our district, and is ready to work with more.

Adena is the best person we could've chosen as our Webpage Guru. In addition to being a dedicated Toastmaster, she works for the Stevens County WSU Extension office, as Coordinator of its *Master Gardener* program. She teaches research-based gardening classes to help people become Master Gardeners, and how to use analytics and social-media marketing techniques to sell their produce in their own communities. She knows all about using social-media and the internet as PR tools, and is poised to teach her fellow Toastmasters how to do the same.

When I asked what brought her to Toastmasters, she told me, "I joined Toastmasters to make personal connections with others." She chose to compete in speech contests for the same reason. "It gets you out of the safety of your own club and helps you to meet and learn from Toastmasters



from other parts of the district, and to hear their story." That's ultimately why she put herself forward as D9's Webpage Guru—to help her fellow Toastmasters have more effective clubs and to make new friends.

Mitchell will employ his personal testimony to enliven and broaden the subject.


